
Smuts and Mandela

South Africa has produced two leaders who achieved global renown in their respective eras: Jan Smuts (Prime Minister, 1919-24 and 1939-48) and Nelson Mandela (President, 1994-99). The former was celebrated for his role in reconstructing international architecture after the world wars; the latter lauded for his leadership during the country's relatively peaceful transition to democracy. While Madiba retains his internationally iconic status, Smuts' reputation is much diminished with historians citing his racism as the cause. In this controversial book, Roger Southall re-evaluates Smuts' career by proposing parallels with the political trajectory of Mandela. *Smuts and Mandela* makes the case that we cannot fully understand Mandela without first understanding his predecessor.

The Hardekraaltjie cemetery was opened in 1910 and closed in 1946 and the community of Tiervlei lost access to the cemetery when the site became the grounds of Tygerberg Hospital. *Landscapes of Dispossession* is what comes of memorializing a burial place that only exists in the minds of community members. Full of emotional stories about interred ancestors and people searching for solace, this book underscores the multifaceted possibilities of restitution.
