


MIDNIGHT IN THE MORGUE




AVAILABLE LIGHT: OMAR BADSHA AND THE Struggle for Change in South Africa Daniel magaziner






SON OF A PREACHER MAN




THE VILLAGE INDIAN vanessa govender




The Fragile Mental Health of Strong Women




Led by Shepherds




Sappi Tree Spotting: Cape from Coast to Kalahari



First published in London in 1988 Chief with a Double Agenda attracted threats of litigation from Mangosuthu Buthelezi. Now published in South Africa Chief with a Double Agenda is a must-read.

Walter Sisulu is often lauded alongside Nelson Mandela and Oliver Tambo and yet the struggle stalwart was so self-effacing that previous biographies fall short of explaining the magnitude of his contributions. This essential and digestible pocketbook makes it clear just how integral Sisulu was to the anti-apartheid movement. Sisulu was the architect of the Congress Alliance and was, for at least a decade, the ANC's chief strategist. He and his wife Albertina helped the ANC maintain its moral authority, establishing a moral compass for the party that today's activists continue to consult.

Raised in a shebeen and surrounded by thugs, Mabulu's background makes plain the source of his courage and charisma. That Mabulu has entrusted his life story to a white man, the sociologist Luke Sinwell, is proof of the respect the two thinkers have for one another. Sinwell draws on numerous original interviews and intimate journals to reveal a sensitive father, a loyal husband and a man who wields his paintbrush to transmit ancestral knowledge.
