

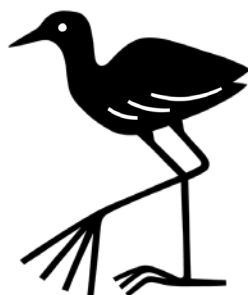

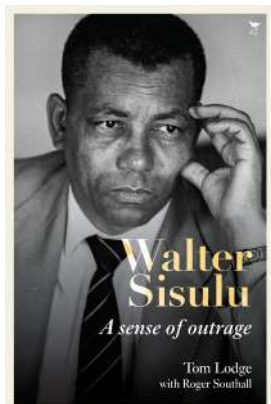

Walter Sisulu is often lauded alongside Nelson Mandela and Oliver Tambo and yet the struggle stalwart was so self-effacing that previous biographies fall short of explaining the magnitude of his contributions. This essential and digestible book makes it clear just how integral Sisulu was to the anti-apartheid movement. Sisulu was the architect of the Congress Alliance and was, for at least a decade, the ANC's chief strategist. He and his wife Albertina helped the ANC maintain its moral authority, establishing a moral compass for the party that today's activists continue to consult.

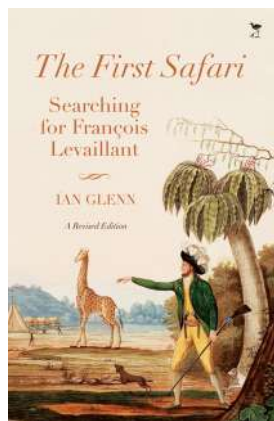


THE SAD BOY'S STARTER PACK AND OTHER POEMS

A Revised Edition

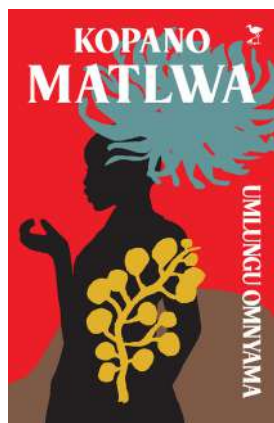

François Levaillant was the first and greatest South African birder, the first major figure of modern ornithology, the creator of the first safari, the first anthropologist of the Cape and the first investigative reporter criticising colonial brutality at the Cape. He predicted the rebellion of the frontier Boers and portrayed the dilemmas of coloured identity. He created the most beautiful illustrated bird books of his time and inspired a map for King Louis XVI that has become the most valuable African map ever produced. His *Travels into the Interior*

of Africa was a best-seller across Europe and the most widely translated text on South Africa until Nelson Mandela's autobiography two centuries later.

The revised second edition reflects new information and research on Levaillant's descendants; the provenance of the Paris bloubok; Levaillant's use of illustrations as a re-viewing of his experiences and his collaboration with Colonel Robert Gordon as a crucial part of his development as an ornithologist.

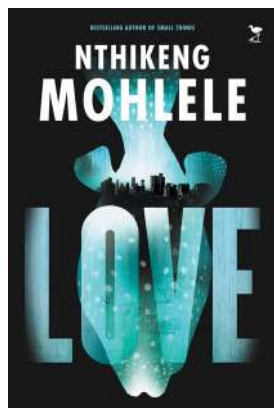
UMLUNGU OMNYAMA

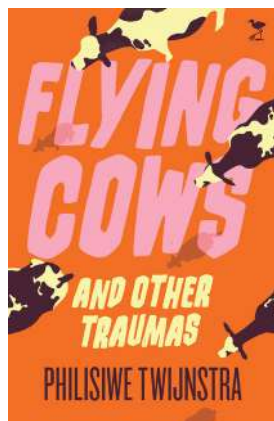


LOVE

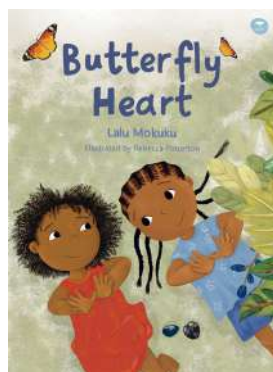
Can her teacher, Mrs Jiya, help Milani find the courage to share her beautiful voice with the world?

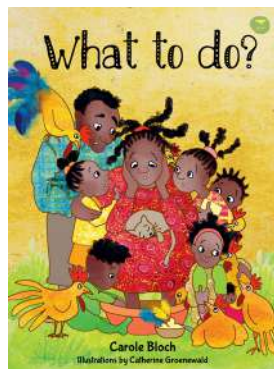

What will they do to bring calm back to the family? A funny, heartwarming retelling of a well known folktale about family, patience and a very wise woman.

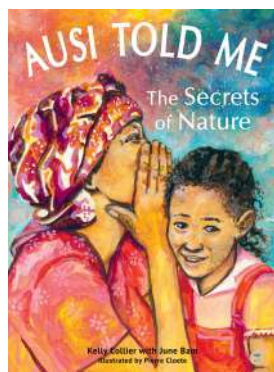

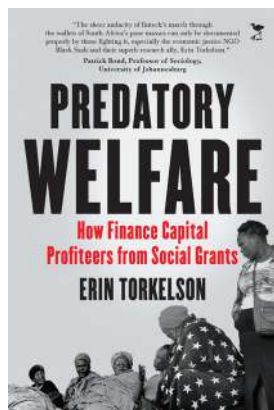

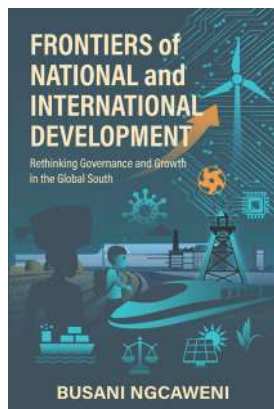
How Finance Capital Profiteers from Social Grants

Predatory Welfare: How Finance Capital Profiteers from Social Grants is a powerful, eye-opening account of how social welfare, distributed in the form of cash transfers, shapes inequality in contemporary South Africa. Erin Torkelson challenges the widely held belief that simply giving money to the poor can solve poverty. Cash transfers are often presented as a straightforward, humane solution embraced across the political spectrum, from global development agencies to progressive academics, to alleviate poverty. But this book reveals a far more complicated and troubling reality.

Drawing on seven years of immersive fieldwork in South Africa – from grant payment queues and grocery stores to Parliament and the Constitutional Court – Torkelson shows how a flagship anti-poverty programme became entangled with predatory finance. Instead of offering relief, cash transfers are often leveraged by lenders as collateral, pulling recipients, especially Black women, into cycles of debt.

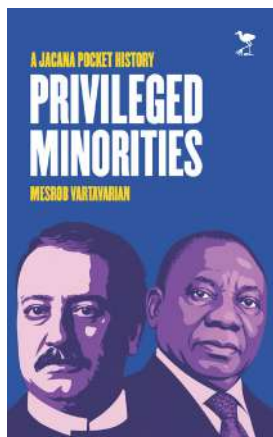

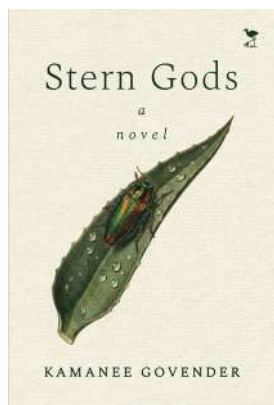

How does a country shaped by anticolonial struggle become fertile ground for wealth concentration alongside enduring inequality? This is the paradox Mesrob Vartavarian dissects in *Privileged Minorities*.

How does South Africa, which should be striving to shake free of colonial and apartheid inequalities, enrich only select groups within the political and corporate spheres, leaving the majority working class behind?

Vartavarian argues that the rise of privileged minorities – small, exclusive groups that dominate political and economic life – parallels the development of successful anticolonial movements. These minorities have secured exclusive advantages, benefits and protections which have enabled material accumulation. This includes land seizures, racialized labour systems, access to coercive institutions, favourable regulatory environments and targeted state expenditures. These mechanisms disproportionately benefit select oligarchies and middle classes.

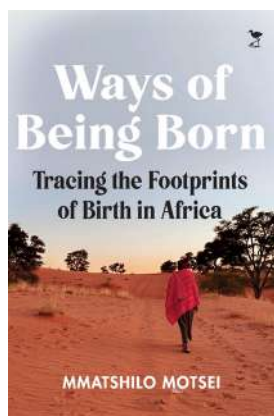
STERN GODS

Stern Gods is a powerful coming-of-age novel set in 1980s apartheid South Africa, during a turbulent State of Emergency. Kaathi Reddy lives in a cramped council house in the Indian township of Bombayville, navigating the harsh realities of poverty, patriarchy and systemic violence. Clever and spirited, Kaathi finds joy in school and her friendships with Zaynub and Losh, but her world is also shaped by silence and suffering: an abusive uncle, a volatile home and the rigid expectations of her Hindu upbringing.

When Losh is raped and silenced by her family, Kaathi's attempt to seek justice sparks a chain of events that leads to devastating consequences. Despite the sorrow, this quietly devastating novel captures a girl's resilience as she begins to piece herself back together. Unflinching, lyrical and deeply empathetic, *Stern Gods* offers a haunting portrait of girlhood and survival in a fractured world.

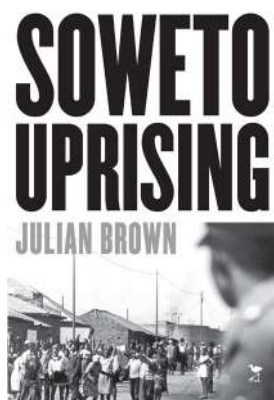

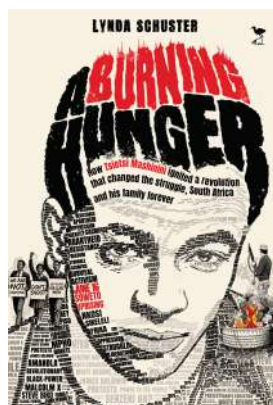

What began as a peaceful and coordinated demonstration in Soweto rapidly turned into a violent protest when police opened fire on students. The uprising also foregrounded the central political role of youth, whose activism would reverberate through the township revolts of the 1980s, while exposing generational tensions within Soweto communities and prompting renewed efforts to forge unity between students and parents.

Drawing on a rich body of oral histories, this revised edition brings to life the sequence of events and reflects on the uprising's profound significance for South African politics and collective memory.

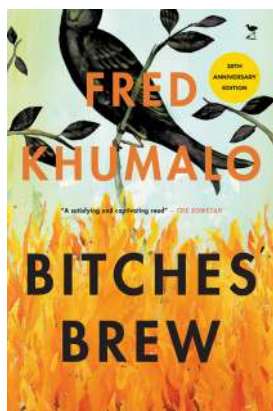

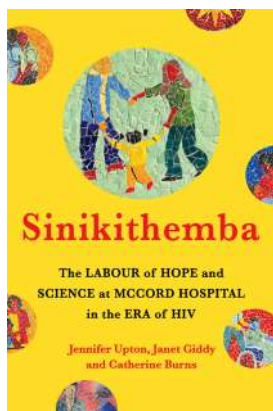
BITCHES' BREW

Bitches' Brew traces the couple's lives and loves through the interweaving of history and memory in the tradition of village storytellers. As he lies dying, and facing the prospect of his assets being confiscated by the Assets Forfeiture Unit, Bra Zakes is surrounded by his trusted lieutenants who wait for their last instructions from their 'mafia' boss. Also at his bedside is Lettie, whom he has not seen for twenty years, and whom he hopes to make a beneficiary of his empire.

The Labour of Hope and Science at McCord Hospital in the Era of HIV

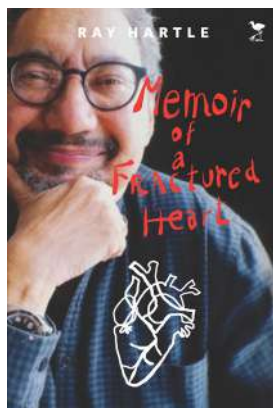

Written by two historians and a medical doctor, *Sinikithemba*, which means 'we give hope' in isiZulu, is a rich and detailed history of medicine-in-society and society-in-medicine, and the relationship between faith, hope, health services, politics and biomedical science during the late-apartheid and post-apartheid era.

Sinikithemba provides a perspective on South Africa's health history seen through the lens of McCord Hospital in Durban and how the hospital community responded to the crisis of HIV.

The chapters build from the 1970s, through the 1980s, and into the time of the HIV pandemic, telling the story of HIV through the experiences and voices of the people in KwaZulu-Natal, which was the epicentre of the AIDS epidemic regionally.

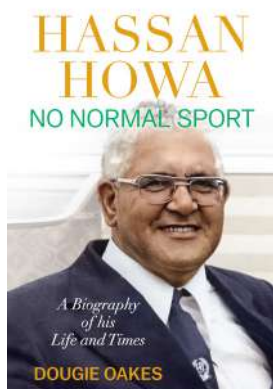
MEMOIR OF A FRACTURED HEART

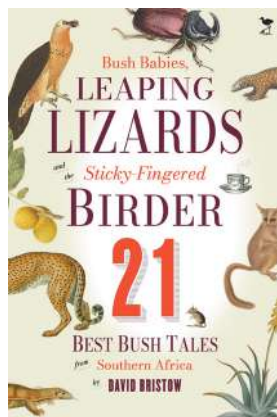

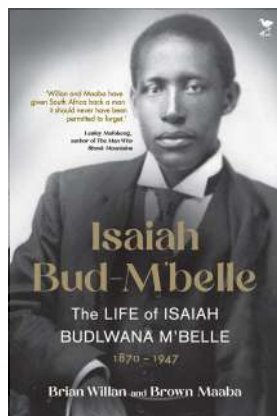

ISAIAH BUD-M'BELLE

The Life of Isaiah Budlwana M'belle, 1870-1947

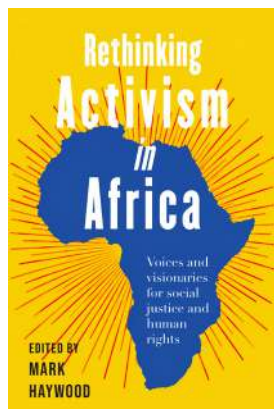
Isaiah Budlwana ('Bud') M'belle (1870-1947) was one of the most talented Black South Africans of his generation, although today his achievements have been largely forgotten. If he is remembered at all, it is as the brother-in-law of Solomon Plaatje. This biography tells his story for the first time.

Born in the Cape Colony in 1870 and of Mfengu origin, M'belle was the first African to pass the Cape civil service entry examinations. He was a highly regarded High Court Interpreter and became a senior official in the Native Affairs Department.

Brian Willan and Brown Maabe trace M'belle's life from his origins in the Lenge mountains in KwaZulu-Natal, through his education, his rise through the civil service, the books he wrote and sponsored, his trip to England in 1908 and his years in both Kimberley and Pretoria.

Through M'belle, readers encounter the broader landscape of Black intellectual and political culture in the late nineteenth and early twentieth centuries.

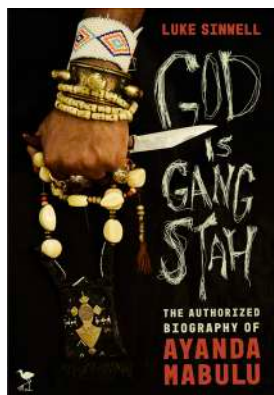

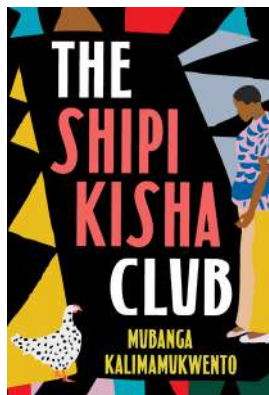
GOD IS GANGSTAH
