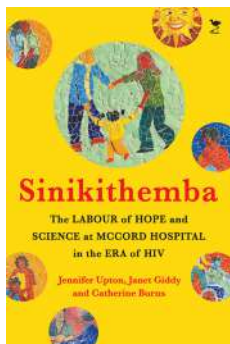

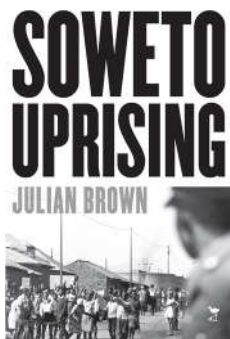
SINIKITHEMBA

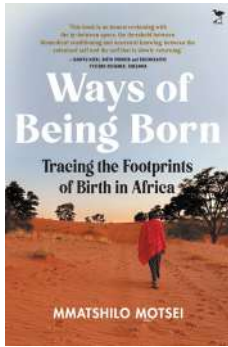

What began as a peaceful and coordinated demonstration in Soweto rapidly turned into a violent protest when police opened fire on students. Orlando West, the epicentre of that day’s events, was transformed into a charged space of political contestation as students claimed the streets and their schools as arenas of defiance and self-determination. The uprising also foregrounded the central political role of youth, whose activism would reverberate through the township revolts of the 1980s, while exposing generational tensions within Soweto communities and prompting renewed efforts to forge unity between students and parents.

Drawing on a rich body of oral histories, this revised edition brings to life the sequence of events and reflects on the uprising’s profound significance for South African politics and collective memory.

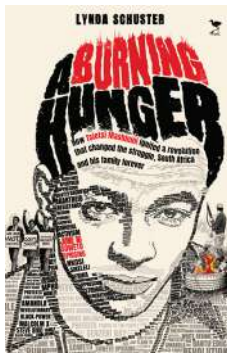

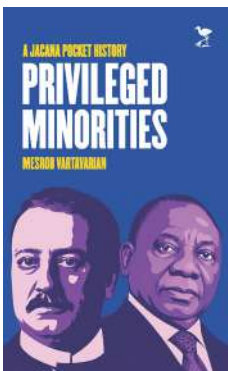

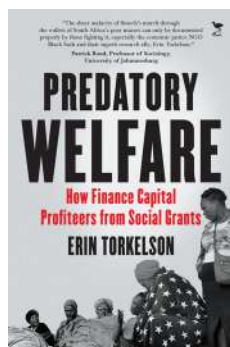

Vartavarian argues that the rise of small, exclusive groups that dominate political and economic life parallels the development of successful anticolonial movements. The book traces how distinct sociocultural groups in South Africa navigated and negotiated these advantages from the Dutch colonial era through the rise and decline of African National Congress rule. Rather than dismantling minority privilege, challenges from marginalised groups reshaped entrenched advantages by incorporating new actors into existing structures. These dynamics have produced composite systems of accumulation that sustain inequality.

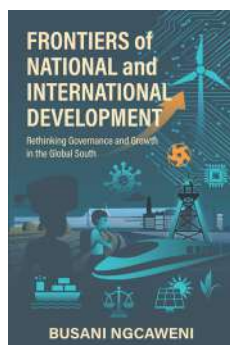

Cash transfers are often presented as a straightforward, humane solution to poverty, but this book reveals the far more complicated and troubling reality of how a flagship anti-poverty programme became entangled with predatory finance. Instead of offering relief, cash transfers are often leveraged by lenders as collateral, pulling recipients, especially Black women, into cycles of debt.

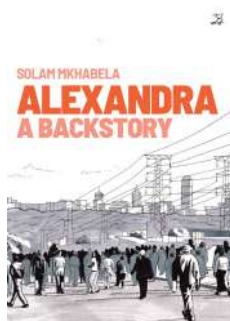
Stories of the Hardekraaltjie Cemetery

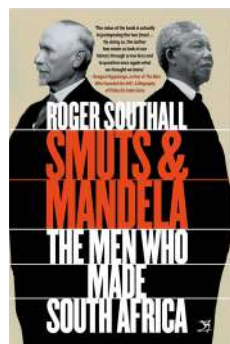

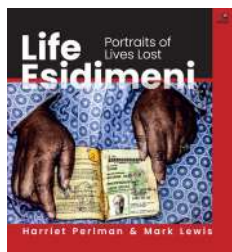

The former was celebrated for his role in reconstructing international architecture after the world wars; the latter lauded for his leadership during the country's relatively peaceful transition to democracy. While Madiba retains his internationally iconic status, Smuts' reputation is much diminished with historians citing his racism as the cause. In this controversial book, Roger Southall re-evaluates Smuts' career by proposing parallels with the political trajectory of Mandela. *Smuts and Mandela* makes the case that we cannot fully understand Mandela without first understanding his predecessor.
